Engage with Humanity

**Photography has nothing to do
with photography.**

Photography has everything to do
with how you engage with
humanity.

The secret to more success in street photography has more to do with sociology than anything else.

**I give you permission to ask for
permission.**

The Big Misconception

“It’ll ruin the moment.”

“It’s not real street photography.”

- Many think asking for permission kills spontaneity
- **Reality: permission can deepen the moment**
- Confidence grows through connection



The Napoli Watermelon Photograph

- Human-first presence
- Standing openly in the scene
- Not hiding or sniping
- Shared space creates layers

sunbathing.**













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
Humanity Creates Access

- People relax
- Gestures become honest
- Moments last longer
- Movement flows naturally



The Instax Technique

- Your Secret Weapon
- Instantly builds trust
- Makes photography a gift
- Transcends language & culture
- Opens doors (literally)
- In Jericho, it led to mountaintop dancing.





Real Example: Brothers in Jericho











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Human First, Photographer Second

- You are a person
- Not a camera with legs
- Participation over extraction
- Presence over distance



**Asking for permission allows
you to work the scene.**

Engagement Is Not Interruption

- No directing
- No forcing
- Comfort being seen
- Presence communicates



Why Engagement Improves Layering

- Less rushing
- Natural overlaps
- Meaningful relationships
- Time enters the frame



Fear Is the Barrier

- Fear of being noticed
- Fear of rejection
- Fear flattens images
- Courage adds depth



Engagement Is Practice

- Standing calmly
- Eye contact
- Letting people notice you
- Comfort grows



The Takeaway

- Layering needs humanity
- Technique builds structure
- Presence fills it
- Photographs feel alive

- Playful energy
- Shared laughter
- No tension
- Moments unfolded naturally

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Play Dissolves Fear

- Less self-consciousness
- People relax
- Gestures loosen
- Scenes last longer



Play Creates Access

- Openness invites participation
- Curiosity replaces control
- Shared rhythm
- Natural layering



Play Sharpens Intuition

- Less thinking
- More feeling
- Responsive timing
- Instinct leads



Seriousness Kills Rhythm

- Rigidity
- Overthinking
- Rushed frames
- Broken scenes



Play Is Not Disrespect

- Mutual
- Respectful
- Not imposed
- Shared experience



How to Practice Play

- Smile
- Let go of outcomes
- Allow imperfection
- Enjoy the moment

Photograph With Intention

Mountain Jesus / Ladder Photograph

- Recognized potential
- Committed to the idea
- Prepared the frame
- Waited for alignment

















What Intention Is

- Choosing what matters
- Narrowing attention
- Waiting for something specific
- Purpose without force



Intention Creates Coherence

- Stay longer
- See repetition
- Recognize alignment
- Avoid distraction



Intention Guides Patience

- Waiting has direction
- Less boredom
- Less restlessness
- Clear expectation



Intention Is Not Control

- No directing people
- No manipulation
- No staging
- Allow life to respond



Let Reality Finish the Idea

- Invite, don't force
- Reality surprises
- Meaning deepens
- Feels discovered



Play + Intention

- Play keeps openness
- Intention keeps focus
- Balance creates flow
- Strong layering emerges

Lesson 6.4

Content vs. Form in Layered Images

What Is Content?

- The moment
- Gesture and emotion
- Life unfolding
- Always unpredictable



What Is Form?

- Structure of the frame
- Placement of elements
- Shape, balance, light
- Created through positioning



Why Content Alone Isn't Enough

- Strong moment
- Weak structure
- Chaotic backgrounds
- Flat photographs



Why Form Alone Isn't Enough

- Beautiful structure
- No emotional weight
- Feels decorative
- Lacks life



Layering Synthesizes Both

- Life enters structure
- Structure holds meaning
- Moment feels inevitable
- Frame feels resolved



Putting Order to Chaos

- Street is chaotic
- Photographer adds order
- Through position
- Through patience



Setting the Stage

- Choose background first
- Watch light
- Define space
- Wait for content



Responsibility of the Photographer

- Not just react
- Sense potential
- Prepare structure
- Stay present



The Takeaway

- Content + form together
- Neither alone is enough
- Layering unites them
- Meaning emerges naturally



Lesson 6.5

Using Layers to Create Meaning

Layers Create Meaning

- Layers do more than organize space
- They create meaning
- Meaning lives between elements
- Relationships matter



Meaning Lives in Relationships

- One subject is rarely enough
- Meaning emerges between things
- Foreground speaks to background
- Context changes interpretation



Meaning lives between things.

Narrative Roles of Layers

- Foreground = emotional, personal
- Middle ground = action
- Background = context
- Each layer carries weight



Separation Creates Clarity

- Overlapping collapses meaning
- Clear layers guide the viewer
- Calm frames read better
- Clarity makes meaning legible



Juxtaposition

- Unrelated elements together
- Creates tension or irony
- Meaning without explanation
- Viewer completes the idea



Distance Is Meaning

- Proximity suggests closeness
- Distance suggests separation
- Spatial relationships matter
- Position communicates feeling



Stillness vs Movement

- Contrast reveals meaning
- Calm inside chaos
- Motion around stillness
- Layers hold contrast



Avoid Forcing Meaning

- Don't announce symbolism
- Heavy-handed images fail
- Prepare conditions instead
- Let meaning emerge



Let meaning emerge.

Embrace Ambiguity

- Not everything must resolve
- Open-ended images linger
- Multiple readings allowed
- Depth over clarity alone



Takeaway

- Layers are meaning tools
- Relationships create story
- Meaning emerges naturally
- Layer with intention



Lesson 6.6

Emotion vs. Abstraction

Two Gravitational Pulls

- Emotion
- Abstraction
- Neither is better
- They feel different



Emotion-Driven Photographs

- Immediate feeling
- Gesture and expression
- Human connection
- Readable quickly



Abstraction-Driven Photographs

- Slower reading
- Shape and form
- Light and shadow
- Feeling over narrative



Layering for Emotion

- Clear subject
- Strong separation
- Clean backgrounds
- Structure supports feeling



Layering for Abstraction

- Shape over subject
- Light over identity
- Overlap allowed
- Ambiguity embraced



When Emotion Leads

- Emotion dominates attention
- Too much complexity dilutes feeling
- Layers must stay simple
- Support the moment



When Abstraction Leads

- Complexity is acceptable
- Viewer explores slowly
- Emotion is indirect
- Feeling arrives over time



Clarity of Intention

- Mixed intentions confuse
- Emotion and abstraction clash
- Ask what you're building
- Choose consciously



Emotion and Abstraction Together

- Often both exist
- One usually leads
- Layering allows transition
- Depth emerges naturally



Takeaway

- Emotion = immediacy
- Abstraction = longevity
- Layering bridges both
- Let images linger



Lesson 6.7

The World as a Stage

The World Is a Stage

- Not a backdrop
- Life is already arranged
- People, light, movement
- Your job is to notice



The Street Is Already Performing

- Gestures repeat
- Patterns emerge
- Rhythms form
- Moments are constant



Stages Exist Everywhere

- Light patches
- Doorways
- Corners and crossings
- Ordinary places



What Defines a Stage

- Potential
- Space for layers
- Room for relationships
- Not visual beauty



Prepare the Stage

- Choose the background
- Watch the light
- Define the frame
- Limit variables




Stop Chasing Actors

- Don't hunt people
- Let people enter
- Let scenes breathe
- Patience creates power



Repetition Reveals the Play

- Same places
- Same light
- Different outcomes
- Instinct becomes knowledge



Witness, Not Director

- Observe instead of control
- Interference weakens images
- Attention strengthens layers
- Let moments happen



Presence Over Cleverness

- Not tricks
- Not speed
- Not forcing ideas
- Being there matters
