Get Close

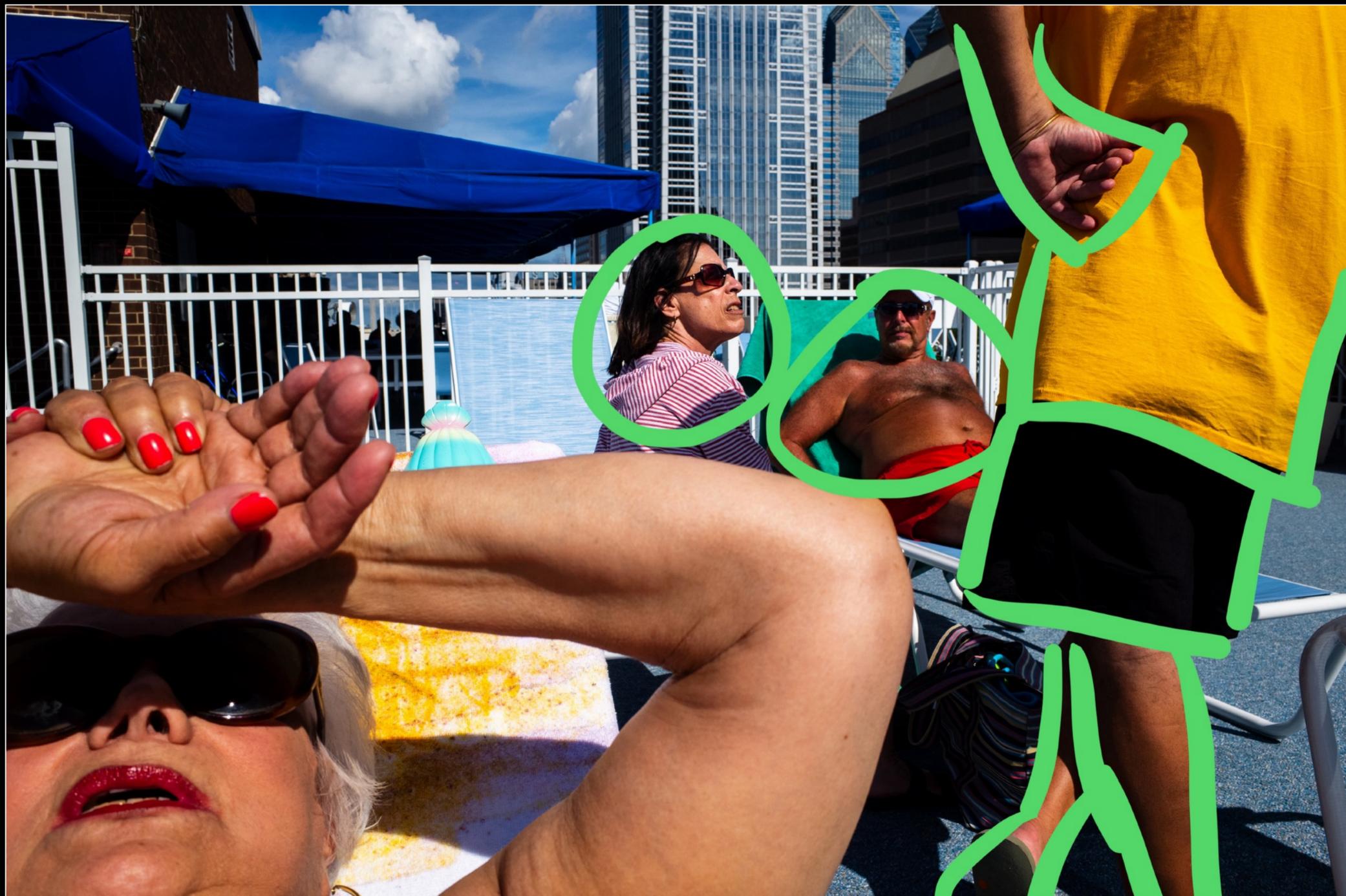
**Closeness is presence, not
pressure.**

Rooftop Grandmother Photograph

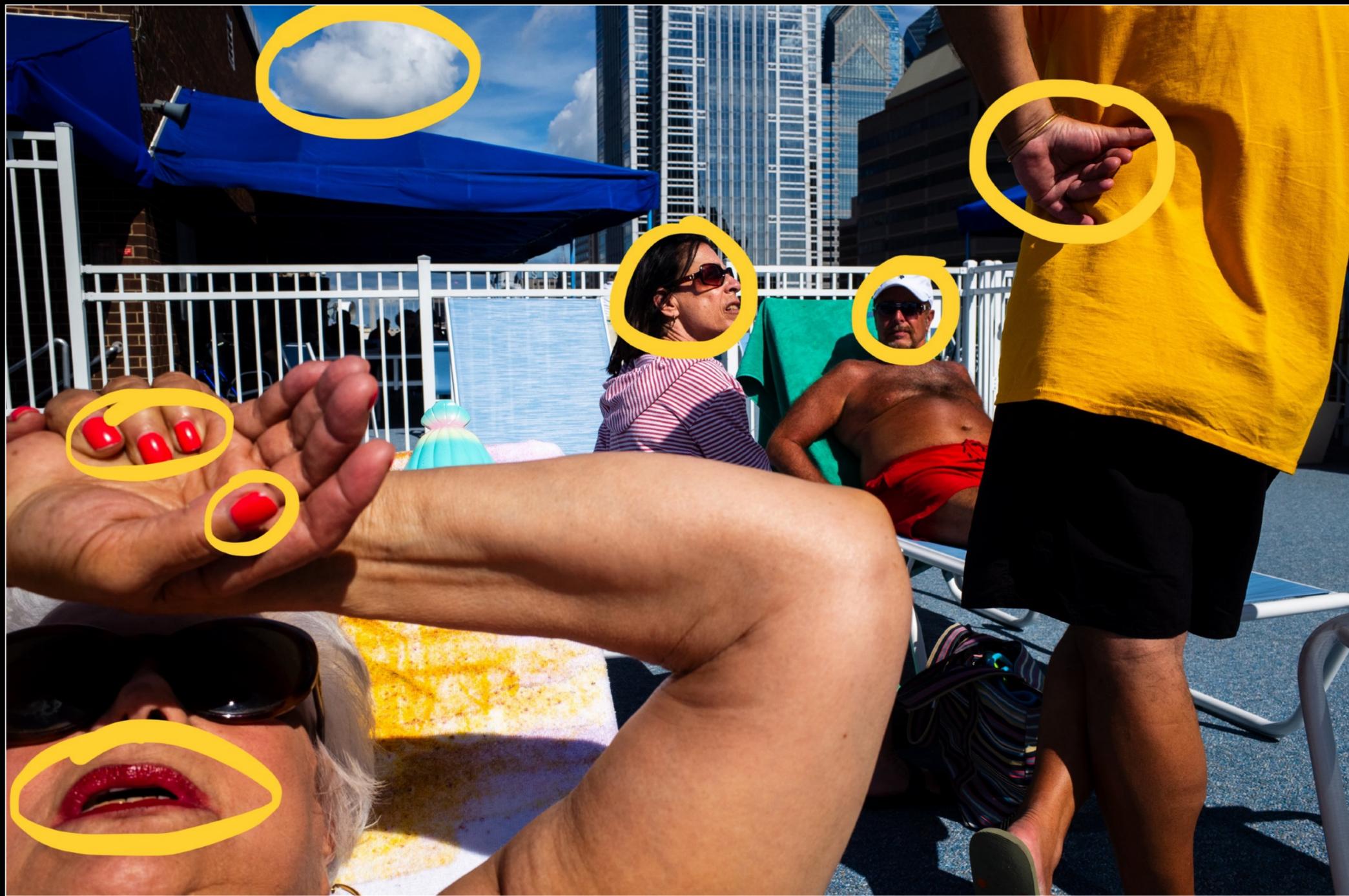
- Physical closeness
- Intimate presence
- Gesture dominates
- Quiet background













Closeness Simplifies Layers

- Foreground asserts itself
- Middle ground supports
- Background becomes atmosphere
- Less complexity needed



Gesture Becomes Structure

- Small gestures matter
- Hands, posture, expression
- Gesture anchors the frame
- Everything else follows



Emotional Proximity

- Viewer feels closeness
- Trust and stillness
- Belonging in the space
- Presence over distance



Not Aggression

- Calm movement
- Respectful distance
- Let people remain themselves
- Belong, don't invade



Background Falls Quietly

- Context only
- No competition
- Hierarchy is clear
- Foreground leads



Courage Over Comfort

- One step closer
- Stay instead of retreat
- Being seen matters
- Quiet courage



The Takeaway

- Closeness strengthens layering
- Simplifies structure
- Adds emotional weight
- Step closer



Lesson 7.2

Juxtaposition

Muhammad Ali Newspaper

- Two elements placed together
- History meets everyday life
- Meaning through proximity
- Nothing explained













What Juxtaposition Is

- Relationship between elements
- Not symbolism
- Not cleverness
- Let meaning emerge



Quiet Frames Speak Loudest

- Restraint matters
- Fewer elements
- Clear separation
- Space for meaning



Juxtaposition Without Chaos

- One dominant element
- One supporting element
- Clean structure
- No visual noise



Let the Viewer Complete the Thought

- Don't explain
- Don't underline
- Trust the viewer
- Meaning becomes participatory



Juxtaposition isn't a punchline.

Positioning Over Timing

- Where you stand matters
- Alignment creates meaning
- Patience over speed
- Relationships resolve



Quiet Confidence

- No spectacle
- No force
- Let it sit
- Meaning unfolds slowly



The Takeaway

- Place elements carefully
- Remove distractions
- Trust relationships
- Let the image speak



Lesson 7.3

Add a Strong Foreground

Mumbai Swimmers + Entering Hand

- Foreground hand enters frame
- Establishes depth instantly
- Anchors the scene
- Invites the viewer inside















Why Foregrounds Matter

- Give the eye an entry point
- Guide visual flow
- Prevent visual drift
- Strengthen hierarchy



Foreground Before Complexity

- One strong element
- Simplifies everything else
- Background can breathe
- Chaos becomes organized



**The foreground is a
compliment.**

Depth Through Separation

- Foreground creates distance
- Layers become clear
- Flat scenes gain dimension
- No explanation needed



Foregrounds Don't Need to Be Big

- Hands
- Shadows
- Partial figures
- Small but dominant



Positioning Over Timing

- Stand close
- Hold position
- Let elements enter
- Don't flinch



Foreground Anchors Feeling

- Viewer feels present
- More immersive
- More alive
- Stronger engagement



The Takeaway

- Commit to one foreground
- Let it lead
- Everything else supports
- Depth and clarity follow



Lesson 7.4

Layering Can Be Simple

Two Palestinian Youths

- Minimal scene
- Clear relationship
- Stillness
- Nothing extra











Two Layers Are Enough

- One subject
- One supporting element
- Clear separation
- Relationship carries meaning



**More elements don't add
meaning. Relationships do.**

Precision Over Quantity

- Small shifts matter
- Framing becomes critical
- No clutter to hide behind
- Accuracy is required



Body Language Is Structure

- Posture
- Distance
- Orientation
- Tension or ease



Quiet Frames Carry Weight

- Less distraction
- Viewer slows down
- Emotion lingers
- Space to breathe



Don't Add What You Don't Need

- Avoid waiting for more
- Extra elements dilute meaning
- Balance can break
- Know when to stop



Restraint Is Confidence

- Trust what's there
- Don't force
- Let the image be quiet
- Confidence shows



The Takeaway

- Layering \neq complexity
- Two elements can be enough
- Clarity over chaos
- Do less



Lesson 7.5

Reflections Create Mystery

Philadelphia Bikers

- Reality split in two
- Direct scene + reflection
- Dual space
- Unresolved tension



Layers Without Clutter

- No new subjects added
- Space multiplied
- Depth increased
- Complexity for free



Mystery Through Ambiguity

- What is real?
- What is reflected?
- Where am I standing?
- Uncertainty keeps interest



Reflections Slow the Viewer

- Eye moves between planes
- Requires longer reading
- More engagement
- Longer image life



Positioning Is Everything

- Find reflective surface
- Control overlap
- Watch separation
- Small moves matter



Avoid Gimmicks

- No forced symmetry
- No clever tricks
- Let reflection feel discovered
- Subtlety wins



Restraint Amplifies Mystery

- Simpler frames work best
- Busy scenes weaken effect
- Quiet compositions
- Let reflection lead



The Takeaway

- Add depth without clutter
- Create ambiguity
- Slow the viewer
- One reality becomes two



Lesson 7.6

Let the Scene Breathe

Beach Shower Scene

- Unrushed moment
- Clear separation
- No visual pressure
- Calm balance











**Find a chokepoint and set
your stage**



Breathing Space Creates Clarity

- Give subjects room
- Avoid overlap
- Allow gestures to finish
- Layers become visible



Not Every Moment Needs Tightness

- Stepping back can help
- Waiting improves separation
- Doing less strengthens images
- Resist crowding



Separation Improves Readability

- Clear gestures
- Distinct subjects
- Fast visual reading
- Viewer knows what matters



Patience Creates Calm Images

- Slow behavior
- Trust timing
- Let moments resolve
- Calm shows in photos



Space Is Not Weakness

- Negative space directs attention
- Creates balance
- Adds weight
- Supports subject



Know When to Stop

- Scene already complete
- Staying can weaken frame
- Walk away confidently
- Trust stillness

- Give space
- Let moments finish
- Calm, confident frames
